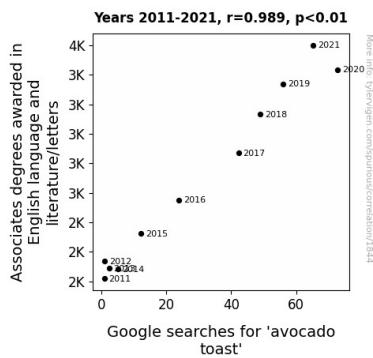


Figure 1. Scatterplot of the variables by year
